BECOMING A PARISH COUNCILLOR

WHAT IS A PARISH COUNCIL?

To appreciate what is involved in being a local councillor, you need to know what a parish council is and what it can (and cannot) do.

A parish council is first and foremost, an elected local authority. It is the tier of local government which is closest to the people. It is not a voluntary organisation, a charity or anything to do with the Church.

WHAT CAN THEY DO?

As parish councils were created in law, they can only act within the law by exercising those duties and powers which are conferred on them by Statute (i.e. a wide range of Acts of Parliament). The powers local councils have are many and varied and include purchase of land and buildings, providing and maintaining village greens, provision of recreational and sporting facilities, street furniture, burial grounds and allotments, crime prevention measures, and traffic calming – to name just a few of the activities that can be carried out locally.

Parish councils have the right to be notified of, and to respond to, all planning applications submitted in their area, and can work in partnership with the District, Borough and County Councils on a whole range of benefits for the local community.

A parish council may raise money by various means to do its work, but usually its main source of funding is through a yearly levy (precept) on the council taxpayers in the parish.

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF THE PARISH COUNCILLOR?

The main thing is that you and your fellow councillors need to have an active interest and concern for your local community. You will represent local people and, if necessary, work in partnership with them and others. Collectively you will want to facilitate the provision of local services and amenities and take decisions which form the policy and governance of the council.

WHY ME?

As a new councillor, you may bring to the council new ideas, a care for your community and a willingness to learn. Initially you may have little knowledge of council work but this, together with experience and confidence, will follow. Training and guidance is available once you take a seat on the council.

PARISH PLAN 2022

The grants for 2020 and 2021 have been put together for the Memorial Garden Project the Parish Council is undertaking. Hopefully you will have noticed that the garden area has been cleared of the overgrown bushes and plants/weeds ready for further works to be carried out in due course.

The initial plan to have a new building sited in the area has changed due to already having a 'community' building in this area. It has been agreed with the Church that St Jude's can be used as a community building and the grant money can be used to install a kitchen and toilet facilities somewhere on the site.

The Memorial Garden will still have seats and will be re-planted with new shrubs. There will also be an area for memorial plaques to be placed by residents if they wish.

Coming soon to Fodderdyke Bank and Spilsby Road

The Parish Council have purchased an Interactive Speed Sign that can be sited in various places at Fodderdyke Bank and at Spilsby Road.

Hopefully it will not be too long before it is in position and being noticed by the drivers using these roads.

The Interactive Speed Sign will collect information, being the number of cars using the road, the time and the speeds that the vehicles travel. It will NOT collect registration numbers. If there is a particular time when vehicles choose to speed then the Police will visit the area with a speed gun and do their work.

It is hoped that this will slow road users down and reinforce the fact that there is a speed limit on these roads.



Hopefully you will have noticed the 30mph signs along these roads.

At this time of year we start to think about the mud drying up and getting out to walk in the beautiful English Countryside again, but where to find new and interesting walks?

MARKET DAY BUS SERVICE

This bus service is available every Wednesday and runs from Toynton All Saints to Boston, leaving Toynton All Saints at 9.55am and picks up along Spilsby Road from 10.00am. The pick-up points are anywhere along the route 'by request' – just put out your hand when you see the Phil Haines coach or the 'school bus' approaching!

The bus goes along Fodderdyke Bank to Small End, Friskney, on to Lade Bank, Bull Drove and Wrangle Bank, and finally picks up at Old Leake Commonside - a real rural bus service! The arrival time in Boston is around 10.45am.

The service leaves Boston for the return journey at 1.15pm, the drop off time for New Leake and Eastville will be from 1.55pm. (Cars could be left in the Village Hall Car Park if you want to give the bus a try.) The cost for a **return journey** is currently **£6.00** if you do not have a bus pass.

Anti-social behaviour

Unfortunately, the past year has seen a rise in the number of incidents of anti-social behaviour occurring in and around our villages. This includes damage to vehicle tyres, various food products thrown at and over vehicles and property.

The village hall has had exterior lights damaged, eggs and baked beans thrown over the doors and windows, front entrance doors kicked, guard rails broken off the ramp to the rear exit and one of the waste bins dumped into the drain plus pounding on the doors when the hall is being used by hirers. Noticeboards have been graffitied on, notices torn off and, in some cases, set alight within the bus shelters.

It is easy to pass these incidents off as 'hi-jinks' or 'boredom' but these incidents, in the main, appear to be the work of the same few individuals.

Many of the incidents have been reported to the police to obtain a crime number for insurance purposes, and to help them build a picture of what is happening in this area so they can increase their patrols as appropriate.

Most of us are proud of the areas we live in, including new residents who are enjoying their life in these villages, and we don't want anyone to get the wrong impression of rural life.

WITHAM FOURTH DISTRICT IDB

2021 turned out to be a “normal” year in that we did not have an extreme weather event and the rain fell evenly across the year. We took **637mm** of rain (25 inches) across the District, compared to around **786mm** (31 inches) in 2019. From January to December 2021 we pumped a total of **13,040** hours in our manned and unmanned pumping stations, this equates to approximately **131 million tonnes of water**. (Rutland Water holds 124 million tonnes!)

This meant that we were able to concentrate on our maintenance programme and we put together a number of bids for capital projects funded by the Environment Agency. We received £160,000 to improve and expand our telemetry system which provides remote data on actual rainfall and water levels around the system. We then use this data to automatically turn on electric pumps to manage water levels. We were also successful in attracting £360,000 of funding to replace weed screen cleaners and control panels at our Lade Bank and Hobhole Pumping Stations that will be delivered in early 2022. This will help with the significant weed build up in front of our Pumping Stations, when we are are pumping.

Next year we are looking at replacing Wrangle Pumping station at Friskney which will cost around £2.5M and will be funded by the Environment Agency. More details will be provided next year.

Finally, COVID permitting, we are hoping to hold another Heritage Open Day at Lade Bank in September and details will appear in the Boston Standard.

Advice:

- If you have used the same password on any other accounts, you should change it there too.
- Turn on two-factor authentication (2FA). Advice and guides on enabling 2FA can be found at www.telesign.com/turnon2fa
- Look after your passwords. Most web browsers will offer to store your online passwords. It's safe to do this. You can also use a standalone password manager app to help you create and store strong passwords.
- Don't forget to use the 'Notify me' function on the website. This will send you a notification if future pwnage occurs and your account is compromised.

Defibrillator

Have you noticed the defibrillator sited on the wall, by the big gates, at the Grant's office in Spilsby Road? This has been provided by the Parish Council and training is available for twelve people on how to the use of a defibrillator. The training will be provided by LIVES free of charge. If you are interested in taking part in the training session, please advise the Clerk to the Parish Council who will advise you when the training has been booked.

The defibrillator gives instructions to anyone who is using it – you cannot get it wrong as it will not let you! If the 'pads' are not positioned in the correct place it will not 'shock'. The 'shock' will only happen when everything is in the right place.

TO USE: DIAL 999 and you will be given a code for access to the defibrillator.

Please do not hesitate to use the defibrillator if required, it is there to help save lives.
